PEACE, MY HEART is an uplifting memorial song. The text, by Indian poet Rabindranath Tagore, speaks of the final voyage as fulfillment. "Let it not be a death, but completeness." The path of life moves towards this "beautiful end."

A recurrent image in the poem is of birds in flight, rising to heaven. Thus, the musical setting includes short "wing-like" accompaniment patterns to frame the voice.

The phrase, "Peace, My Heart," is initially presented gently, to offer comfort to the dying and to those left behind. Then the expression grows in intensity (marked "impassioned"), since the pain and beauty of the parting are deeply felt. As the voice fades away, the soul takes flight.

"I bow to you, and hold up my lamp to light you on your way."

Peace, my heart, let the time for the parting be sweet. Let it not be a death but completeness. Let love melt into memory and pain into songs. Let the flight through the sky end in the folding of the wings over the nest. Let the last touch of your hands be gentle like the flower of the night. Stand still, O Beautiful End, for a moment, and say your last words in silence. I bow to you and hold up my lamp to light you on your way.
